

Boundary / Possession Dispute Representation

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This guide explains what the tool produces, how to use the output, and what to watch for. The actual output (draft/report) is generated on the tool page.

Background

Drafts a representation for a boundary or possession dispute — seeking an official survey/demarcation, reporting an encroachment, or asserting possession — to the revenue or survey authority, with the facts, the record and survey basis and the relief, and flags when the matter needs a civil suit instead.

Purpose of this tool & output

Draft a boundary or possession dispute representation — for a survey demarcation, encroachment or possession issue — to the revenue authority

How the output is used

Use the drafted representation — the facts, the record and survey basis and the relief — to seek an official survey/demarcation, report an encroachment, or assert possession before the revenue/survey authority, and note when a civil suit is the right route instead.

Who receives it

The revenue/survey authority (Tehsildar/Survey Officer/Circle Officer) for a demarcation or encroachment representation; a civil court where title/possession must be decided.

How to submit / file it

Apply to the revenue/survey authority with the RoR/map, the identity and the specific request (demarcation, encroachment removal, possession); attend the site survey; escalate to a civil suit if the dispute is over title.

Who should vet it

A property lawyer — to judge whether the matter is a revenue demarcation or a civil title/possession suit, and to argue it.

Important cautions

A revenue demarcation cannot decide title — a genuine title/possession dispute needs a civil suit, and acting on self-help (fencing/blocking) can invite a criminal case. Get a lawyer to pick the right forum before you act.
