

Tenant / Employee / Domestic-Help Police Verification Pack

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This guide explains what the tool produces, how to use the output, and what to watch for. The actual output (draft/report) is generated on the tool page.

Background

Prepares a police verification submission for a tenant, an employee, or a domestic worker or driver — with the verification form content, the consent and ID/address documents, and the submission route (online portal or local station) — so a landlord or employer meets the verification requirement and reduces risk.

Purpose of this tool & output

Prepare a police verification submission for a tenant, employee or domestic worker, with the form, consent and document set

How the output is used

Use the verification form content, the consent and the document set to submit the tenant/employee/domestic-worker police verification on the state police portal or at the local station, and keep the acknowledgement.

Who receives it

The local police station / the state police online verification portal (many states have a tenant and domestic-help verification service).

How to submit / file it

Submit online on the state police portal or at the station with the verification form, the consent, and the ID/address documents of the person; the police verify and issue an acknowledgement/report.

Fees & charges

A nominal fee applies in some states (often free); a facilitation charge if a CSC/agent is used.

Who should vet it

No professional is needed — the tool prepares it for direct submission; a lawyer is relevant only if an adverse report needs to be contested (use the character-verification tool).

Important cautions

Verification needs the person consent and correct ID/address, and it reduces but does not eliminate risk; some states make tenant/domestic-help verification mandatory. Verify the current portal and requirement for your state.
